Abbot Placid Spearritt Scholars for 2016.



The Abbot and the Archives Research and Publications Committee are delighted to announce the APSMS scholars for 2016. As in 2013, it was a difficult decision but, in the end, the Selection Committee decided upon Eugenia Schettino and Bob Reece as the ones who best fulfilled the ambitions and goals of the Abbot Placid Scholarship.

Eugenia Schettino is already well known to archives as she was Judy McGuinness' critical reader for the Salvado to Bérengier transcriptions and translations which were completed by Judy during 2014 and 2015. Eugenia was born in Orizaba, Veracruz, Mexico.



Our other Scholar is also well known to New Norcia Archives. Bob Reece is

Professor Emeritus in History at Murdoch University and Senior Honorary Research Fellow at the University of W.A. With an M.A. from the University of Queensland and a Ph.D. from the Australian National University, he taught at Murdoch University from 1978 and at University College Dublin from 1987 until 1989. His interest in New Norcia was sparked by his biographical work on Daisy Bates (*Daisy Bates: Grand Dame of the Desert*, 2005) and her Victoria Plains informant, William Monop, which led him to publish a number of articles for *New Norcia Studies* and *The Invincibles: New Norcia's Aboriginal Cricketers* 1879-1906 (2014).

Congratulations to Eugenia and Bob – we wish them well in their research. The Abbot and the Archives Research and Publications Committee would also like to take this opportunity to thank once again all those benefactors who contributed so generously towards the Abbot Placid Spearritt Memorial Scholarship. The Scholarship has permitted us to further research into the holdings of the monastery's archives and this has resulted in the publication of three books (2014), the launch of another book (Salvado's 1883 Report to Propaganda Fide) in November this year and the correspondence between Bishop Salvado and Théophile Bérengier which we hope to publish later next year. *Contributed by Peter Hocking, Archivist*

Never a dull moment in the New Norcia Institute for Benedictine Studies



The months of August and September have been busy times for *the New Norcia Institute for Benedictine Studies*. Luigi Gioia osb, Professor of Systematic Theology at Sant' Anselmo in Rome, gave our Annual Institute Day on the August 8. Luigi drew together the fundamental

teaching of Vatican II and the Wisdom tradition of Monastic theology in a stimulating and challenging set of lectures.

Later in August the Monastery hosted the Annual General Meeting of the Benedictine Union of

Australia and New Zealand. As part of the Meeting the Union always includes a studies day. This year, the Institute took responsibility for this day presenting a Special Event: "Light and Darkness: Truth and Meaning in the Universe", to mark the 100 years since the publication of Einstein's Theory of Relativity.



During September, Sr Jill O'Brien sgs, was invited by the Liturgical Commission of the Diocese of Auckland in New Zealand, to offer workshops on worship spaces that encourage "full and active participation" in the liturgy. She addressed a variety of audiences, including seminarians, priests and architects of the diocese, school religious educators as well as parish groups.

And most recently, Professor Katharine Massam, from Pilgrim Theological College, presented an undergraduate and Graduate unit, Living the Rule, at the Institute. Fourteen students from Victoria and Western Australia participated in a community of practice which is the method by which Katharine introduces students to the Rule of Benedict as it is and has been lived at New Norcia. This experience gives students a glimpse of how Benedict may speak to the world today. *Contributed by Sr Carmel Posa*

New Norcia Writers' Festival 2015.

In conjunction with the West Travel Lounge, New Norcia held its first writers' festival on September 12th.

Guests were treated to five sessions, a monastery tour, a viewing of the Abbey Press in action, a rare book display, champagne tasting and a delicious buffet lunch. Feedback from the day seems to indicate that it was the unique combination of reading, writing, dance and music, the use of different venues and the quality of the sessions that made the 100 or so participants so glowing in their reviews. From the very beginning, Festival Director, Will Yeoman, wanted it to be a festival that had literature at its centre while embracing other arts too, a collaboration as it were. HR Outlook - Farm Safe in WA.

Representing New Norcia, I attended a Farm Safe meeting held in Calingiri on the 7th September; it proved informative and useful in the identification and management of safety issues here at New Norcia.

The details below highlight the concern in relation to safety in Agricultural related activities with 27 deaths in 2015 across Australia so far in comparison with the figures for both Mining and Construction. It can be argued that both Construction and Mining employ significantly larger numbers of people than agriculture.

Worksafe WA have developed and released an Agricultural Strategic Plan 2014 -2016. In alignment with the Worksafe WA mission statement to 'inspire employers and workers to ensure workplaces are safe through partnership, education and enforcement', they have developed a strategy for improving safety in farming related activities.

OHS legislation is relevant and binding for all farming enterprises whether a small family run business or a larger commercial enterprise. The Legislation applies when the farm is a 'Mum & Dad' operation as much as it does to the business employing other people.

Worksafe WA have prepared an Agriculture safety and health checklist and with the planned announcement of random checks being conducted on broad acre farms throughout West Australia, this is a welcome aid in the identification and subsequent management of safety risks and hazards in the farming environment.

New Norcia is unique in that it is not only a farm, but home to the Monastic Community, the employees who live on site, the New Norcia Hotel frequented by locals and visitors alike, hosts numerous events through the year and is visited by thousands of tourists and others seeking a place to reflect and gain peace. A focused effort is being made to ensure New Norcia is compliant with Worksafe WA across all areas of our operations so we can ensure the safety of our visitors and employees alike. *Contributed by Coralea A'Court, HR Manager*

The "street chaplains" are an Australia wide organisation of volunteers working in the nightclub districts of many towns and cities in Australia from 11pm until 4 or 5am offering pastoral care to those in need. The volunteers come from a wide variety of Christian Churches and have had huge success. The police chief in Busselton stated that street crime has dropped by 45% since the street chaplains started their work there.

Saturday 19 September 2015: New Norcia Library was proud to host a visit by members of the W.A. branch of the Australian Garden History Society. Along with the Society's enthusiastic members came spouses and visitors, both eastern states and overseas.



From its inception and in keeping with Benedictine monastic tradition, New Norcia has always had a library. While much of the emphasis was and remains religious and theological, the

library's collection is wide ranging and eclectic. From the point of view of the AGHS members, the botanical, general gardening, and allied topics represent a varied and invaluable trove of books and information, many of which are long out of print. The condition of many of these books evidences their usefulness -- these books were gardening and orchardist tools as much as any water bucket and shovel. From a librarian's point of view, it was wonderful to interact with the Society's members. They reviewed garden history through an Australian lens, whilst focusing on the books' direct relationship to the New Norcia farming endeavour that to this day sustains the Benedictine community. PILGRIMS

Perhaps life itself is a pilgrimage, to the future we can't see, from a past we carry with us; but the quest is the aim.

Recently well-known WA ceramic artist and teacher Albie Herbert donated his terracotta sculpture 'Pilgrims' to the collection of the Museum and Art Gallery of New Norcia. Modelled as 3 interlocking pieces, the artwork embodies the *camino* or journey undertaken since mediaeval times as a pathway spiritual enlightenment and personal growth. Made after seeing documentaries on the mediaeval pilgrimages to Canterbury, also regarding





the more-recent *camino* to New Norcia and re-reading Chaucer's 15thc. Canterbury Tales, Albie "was fascinated by the spiritual bonding that occurred on the trek and the hardship and happiness they experienced."

The nine figures modelled in clay express all the individual characteristics of class, role and reason present in the mediaeval European community, led by the nobleman with his Bible, crucifix and page, followed by men and women carrying the barest essentials, and accompanied by a monk with his cross and staff. The artist was keen for his work to be seen by like-minded people in a context where the pilgrimage is
